Interpretation of the Biblical Text
1. What does Paul mean when he says that "flesh and blood" and "the perishable" cannot inherit the kingdom of God in v. 50? How does this serve as an introduction to what he says in vs. 51-57?
2. How does Paul describe the moment of the resurrection of the dead (and the living!) in vs. 51-54? What does this tell us about the end of the days? What comfort should we take from this description? How is it a "mystery"?
3. Paul begins closing his argument in vs. 54-55 by quoting Isaiah 25 (and Hosea 13)? Read Isaiah 25:1-12. How does Isaiah 25 help explain what Paul is saying at the end of 1 Corinthians 15? What is Paul's point in 1 Corinthians 15:56-57?
4. After a lengthy theological discussion of the resurrection, Paul ends with some simple, practical admonitions in v. 58. What does he say? What does he mean with each of these?
